
And let's not forget the Christmas Party on 12 Dec

Member's Questions

A member asked for advice regarding the bidding of the following hand. Dealer N, nil vul.



The analysis by Deep Finesse showed a remarkable set of possible outcomes - in NT E/W can make only 7 tricks, but they can make 12 tricks in either minor.

With regard to the bidding, E will show a balanced hand in the 20-22 hcp range. In most partnerships responder will have methods for showing major suits - Stayman or transfers. But I suspect fewer pairs will have ways of showing minor suits.


Holding the W hand I would respond 3S to partner's 20-22 point balanced hand, showing length in both minors. Opener with good cards in the Major suits may still opt for 3NT, especially at pairs. But here opener will likely re-bid 4C and game in Clubs will be reached.

In recent lessons Simon outlined methods to show or find minor suits after partner opens 1NT.

- INT:3C=both minors, pass or correct
- 1NT:3D=both minors, game forcing
- 1NT:2C:2D:2S=minor suit Stayman*



A member highlighted this hand from the Saturday II October session and asked about bidding, with the remark: "E opened 2S, I bid 2NT for the minors, 3S from W, what next?"



After E opened a weak 2S, it is very common practice to use a bid of 2NT to show a hand you would have opened 1NT, ie 15-17hcp with S well stopped. That leaves two ways of showing a hand with both minors:

- a) bid 3D, and after the expected Spade support from W now bid 4C;
- b) bid an immediate 4NT, asking partner to pick her better minor.

This hand is good enough for option b). You will certainly reach 5C, and if your agreement is that the latter bid shows a much stronger hand than the former, N may judge that her cards are good enough to bid 6C.



Member's Questions cont.

Opening Lead to 6NT Contract

This hand was played at the Club on Friday 24 Oct. A popular contract was 6NT by E. Despite the combined 33hcp, it is not a great contract because of no long suit and compressed Club honours.



At 6 tables South led a H, giving declarer a 2nd H trick she could not make herself, and this usually meant the contract was made; presumably declarer guessed the Spade suit correctly. Simon Andrew led the C8 and Chrissie Baynes led the S4; after these leads the contract cannot be made.

Leading against a lower NT contract, the recommended strategy is for the defence to start with their long suit, with the hope that eventually they may establish some length winners. Against a 6NT contract, there is no "eventually". The leader's strategy should be to lead as safely as possible, so as not to give declarer a trick she cannot make herself.

Wallace Park Precinct turns 21!

To celebrate this wonderful hub of community facilities Wallace Park Precinct is having a community celebration event on Sat 6 December from 9am-1pm.

The amphitheatre between the Noosaville Library and Noosa Leisure Centre will be full of come and try activities from Wallace Park user groups including Bridge, Group Fitness and Jump Bunch (junior gymnastics) classes, second hand book sales, FREE entertainment and Farm Animals (sponsored by Friends of Noosa Library), storytelling and much more- it's all FREE so come and check out the wonderful activates you and your family can enjoy at Wallace Park- there is an activity for every age!

The Wallace Park Precinct encompasses an area of 90,000m² on Wallace Drive, Noosaville (off Eumundi Noosa Road). The Precinct is the site of several council-owned facilities and a number of Community groups.

Development of the Precinct commenced in the late 1980s based upon a Master Plan developed by John Mainwaring. The intention was to create a mixed usage 'people's place' centred around the historic Wallace House and incorporating a range of community facilities as well as public outdoor spaces. 21 years later it has become just that!





Wallace Park has strong state and local heritage significance. The site has connections to the original inhabitants, the Kabi Kabi (Gubbi Gubbi) people (there is a yarning circle in Wallace Park behind Wallace House), as well as associations with the settlement and early development of the Noosa area.

The land was originally owned by Walter Hay, an early settler in the district. After fire destroyed Hay's home, he sold the estate to Arthur Wallace Wallace built a home for his family (Wallace House) as well as a jetty and boathouse on the river and established an orchard in the grounds. The property was the family base for several generations of the Wallace family. Arthur Wallace died in 1974 and the property was reluctantly sold by the family in 1978. For the next several years the house was a rental property and for a time was home to a casino before being acquired by Noosa Council in 1992 and in 1993 Noosa Arts and crafts was officially opened. In 1999 the house was damaged by fire, however was repaired and Noosa Arts and Crafts Association have grown in membership strength from year to year.

Noosa Community Care (formally Noosa Respite Centre) was next to move into Wallace Park in 1992, followed closely by Noosa Leisure Centre and Noosaville Library on the same day (Dec 4 1993). Tewantin-Noosa Meals on Wheels and Noosa Bridge Club opened their doors at Wallace Park also in 1994. The Noosa Parks Association's Environment Centre was built in 1992- 1993 and officially opened in February 1994 and after that the Endeavour Foundation building completed the Precinct group in 2008.



Kevin's Corner

Some contracts are easy to play but others like this one require a PLAN and careful consideration as the play continues:

Vul: NS



Bid	ld	in	g:

South	West	North	East
ıS	2 H	Pass	Pass
X	Pass	2 S	Pass
3 S	Pass	4 S	All pass

Opening lead: H K

To South this looks like an impossible contract. However, he was told long ago (by Rob Ritchie) to place the strategic cards in the hands where they would allow him to succeed. So he placed both the minor suit Kings in East's hand. However, to finesse, South had to PLAN his transport to North's hand. This can only be done by retaining his Spade 2. All goes to plan, ruffing the 3rd Heart lead high, drawing trumps, crossing to dummy using the vital Spade 2. He now leads the Club Queen, but when East does not cover with the King, he discards the Club Jack to preserve his transport back to the 9 or 10. This is also vital to return to dummy to finesse the Diamonds.

I can already hear people saying "too hard", but you will be surprised at how often this play works and if we are going to go down, then we will go down fighting.
